September 26 was the annual International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons, but we must organize activities now and into the future (so we will HAVE a future!): Is anyone surprised that the corporate-owned mainstream news media ignored this? Nuclear weapons are a real and present danger to all life on earth. If an accident, miscalculation or computer error were to happen right now, you could be dead 30 minutes from now! DOCUMENTARY FILM "Command and Control" exposes serious dangers of accidents with nuclear weapons: Screenings of "Command and Control" will occur in various places. It's a new "American Experience" film from director Robert Kenner ("Food, Inc." and "Merchants of Doubt"). This hour-long documentary, based on Eric Schlosser's best-selling book (www.psr.org/resources/psr-bookshelf/command-andcontrol-nuclear.html) reenacts the dramatic experience of Air Force personnel grappling with a major nuclear accident involving an Arkansas-based Titan II missile and its 9-megaton warhead in 1980. A worker accidentally dropped a socket, puncturing the fuel tank of an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) carrying the most powerful nuclear warhead in our arsenal. This accident ignited a series of feverish efforts to avoid a nuclear catastrophe. This documentary film is a minute-by-minute account of this long-hidden story. Putting a camera where there was no camera that night, Kenner brings this nonfiction thriller to life with stunning original footage shot in a decommissioned Titan II missile silo. Eyewitness accounts – from the man who dropped the socket, to the man who designed the warhead, to the Secretary of Defense – chronicle nine hours of terror that prevented an explosion 600 times more powerful than Hiroshima.
