"Empowering Ourselves for Profound Democracy"

- Oppression by big business and powerful political forces
- Unresponsive government
- Homogenous, mind-numbing mass media
- Environmental degradation
- Serious crises but a frustrating culture of denial

All of the problems we face seem so huge, but we seem so powerless. People have tried to promote peace, social justice, the environment, and progressive issues. But for decades the conservative presidents and Congresses have pushed us backward.

As a result, many progressives feel frustration, anger, powerlessness, despair, and depression. The general public also seems demoralized and immobilized. Why bother?

However, when we look around our local community we find that many people have been successfully organizing ways to meet our political, social, economic, cultural and environmental needs. Some of these solutions are 15-25 years old, such as the Procession of the Species (which has been copied in communities around the world), the Dispute Resolution Center (DRC) of Thurston County, Thurston Community Television (TCTV), and the Olympia Food Co-Op (which is more than 30 years old).

All of these are working successfully and thriving!

It turns out we really can empower ourselves and organize from the grassroots up to meet our various needs directly. We don't need to wait for governments or other big, formal systems to impose top-down solutions upon us. We can empower ourselves to meet our needs!

- This is true in the COMMUNITY realm: The Dispute Resolution Center trains mediators to help people learn how to resolve conflicts with each other in mutually agreeable ways instead of giving up our power to police or courts.
- This is true in the **MEDIA** realm: Thurston Community Television (TCTV) offers training, equipment, and air time at low cost to empower people of all ages and income levels to create their own media.
- This is true in the CULTURAL realm: The Procession of the Species provides satisfying and environmentally respectful entertainment for people of all ages without any commercialism or exploitation of live animals. Furthermore, the Procession inspires and cultivates the creativity of people of all ages as they use the Procession's art studio to design and create their own images, costumes, and musical and dance performances.
- This is true in the **ECONOMIC** realm: The Olympia Food Co-Op is owned by the consumers and managed by the staff through consensus. The TULIP Credit Union also is owned by its members to serve their economic needs locally without succumbing to exploitation by big banks.

The net result of this is that **ordinary people really are empowering themselves and building a new culture of profound democracy – from the bottom up!** We're doing it ourselves!
